Math Department offers Fast Track MTH 104/165 Co-requisite Learning Community

The Math Department is currently piloting a new co-requisite Fast Track model, where students enroll in linked sections of MTH 104 Intermediate Algebra and MTH 165 College Algebra. MTH 104/165 Fast Track is a 7-credit course, taught as a learning community. There were two sections of the Fast Track learning community in the Fall semester, taught by Linda Carson and Mark Bellavia, and they are again offering two sections this spring semester. Students entering the learning community must be at Math placement level 6 or have taken MTH 098 with a C or better, which is the same as the prerequisite for traditional sections of MTH 104.

Please consider these Fast Track sections when advising students for next Fall semester who are at level 6 and need MTH 165 or higher as part of their pathway. We have found that students on the pathway for a Business or Engineering degree would be good candidates for this learning community, but any level 6 student is eligible. Recap: Melinda Karp's visit on February 5th

On February 5th, Melinda Karp paid a visit to MCC. Having worked previously at CCRC for nearly 20 years, it became clear to her that in addition to research, reformers also need help understanding what to do with it. Melinda has worked with individual colleges and reform-oriented learning communities across the country to apply research findings to transformational reform processes. The Integrated Advising Board has been working with Melinda to help navigate their advisement redesign efforts. Her visit provided an opportunity for other members of the college community to understand more about the reasons behind this redesign and to offer their input.

Re: Integrated Advising Board (IAB)

Q: What is it?

A: The Integrated Advising Board is a committee that has been charged with making recommendations on an advising model at MCC to align with Guided Pathways. Their overall goal is to take the next step from the previous Shared Advising Model.

The new advising model will include:

- An understanding that student supports are an essential component of the student experience
- Documentation of the identity and purpose of the student/advisor relationship that is communicated to students from acceptance and each semester through graduation
- A centralized point of contact for all new students
- Assigned advisors will have expertise in the student's pathway
- Identified checkpoints where students chose and confirm pathway as defined as a degree path that leads to their academic and career goals.

Q: Who is involved?

A: The IAB was selected and charged by Provost Wade and VP Holmes and brings together various areas of MCC to ensure that many voices can contribute to any recommendations made. Four members of the IAB compose the steering committee, who are charged with drafting the model with input from the other IAB members.

Q: How are decisions being made?

A: The committee makes recommendations by bringing together Guided Pathways philosophy, expertise in their own areas of the college, and feedback from other areas where necessary. One way they are including feedback from others is reviewing all feedback and notes from the different sessions during Melinda Karp's visit on February 5th. The IAB's recommendations are then brought to the sponsors who make a final determination of how recommendations may be implemented.

Re: IAB, Continued...

Q: How does the IAB's work affect me? Are these recommendations resulting in real action?

A: You have likely already seen some changes that the IAB was involved in without even knowing it! IAB was involved in the implementation of DegreeWorks notes and the accompanying manual. This is an important change to align advising methods with the Guided Pathways philosophy as it will increase continuity of the student's experience and allow everyone involved in the holistic advising of the student to have access to this information. IAB is also involved in drafting a new Student Advisement Satisfaction Survey (pertaining to all advisement experiences across the College, not just Student Services). Together with IR, they will soon make recommendations on the questions that should be included, and the sponsors will be making a plan for implementation.

Q: How will the IAB's work benefit student success?

A: Studies have shown that comprehensive advising greatly increases student success (see chart below). While every institution's approach will be unique, we know that a comprehensive advising plan should use "SSIPP":

Sustained: Ongoing support rather than an "inoculation" approach


<u>S</u>trategic: Differentiated services to maximize capacity

Integrated: Services are an integral part of all students' experiences, and are not viewed as stand-alone interventions

Proactive: Services and information are provided to students before they're requested

Personalized: Students receive the support they need when they need it, from an individual who knows them well
