Before the meeting

- Find out their job and how they feel Toastmasters could help them

At the meeting

- Greet them and introduce them to VP Membership and President
- Sit with them. If you have a big role, ask a nearby member to help them.
- Formally introduce them to members during the meeting
- Show them the agenda, explain the various roles
- Encourage them to vote for best table topics speech and write notes of encouragement.

After the meeting

- •Thank them for coming and invite them back
- Email them and follow up with VP Membership to let her know if they are interested in joining.







Fear is a Factor: Seven Steps to Success!

We all fear failure when we approach a new task. Putting ourselves "out there" can be crippling but for some, like the Three Little Pigs, failure isn't an option. There is good and bad fear; those who can manage this emotion sit in the driver's seat on the road to success.

Good fear occurs when you act in your best interest, usually intuitively, such as when you hand over your wallet to a thief. You feel bad fear when you fight what comes naturally, such as flailing your arms when you slip on ice. "Tuck and roll" when you perceive danger; it can make the difference between success and flat-on-your-fanny failure.

Success or failure when experiencing fear is an "inside" job. Here are seven helpful tips:

- 1. Never accept rejection. Believe in yourself! Remember: you get what you expect. So expect success.
- **2.** The <u>perception</u> of failure is an isolated situation. We criticize ourselves because we are our own worst enemy. Others most likely see us as successful.
- **3. Keep expectations realistic.** For your first speech, a one hour monologue is unrealistic. Challenge yourself slightly, adding more difficulty after each.
- **4. Focus on your strengths.** If you are a word wonder, share stories. If your hands do the talking, show off your descriptive gestures. If your smile shines, use it!
- **5.** Vary your approach. Learn from mistakes. Change how you prepare and deliver your next talk.
- **6. Failure is temporary.** Each opportunity is a learning experience. Success happens when you learn from failure. (See tip 5.)
- 7. Never give up! When we calm our fears through positive thoughts, great things happen. Tuck and roll with each challenge and glide smoothly on to your next success!

Roberts Rules of Order Basics

- The chair (or president) cannot make a motion. The chair needs to formally recognize the person speaking so that he or she may make a motion.
- If the motion is not seconded, it dies and the chair says "as there is no second, the motion will not be considered."
- If there is a second, the chair says "it has been moved and seconded that..." and asks for discussion.
- When the chair wants to stop discussion, she says "the question is on the adoption of the motion..."and asks for "aye" or "no" votes. The chair then explains that the vote passed and the motion is being adopted or that it did not pass and will not be adopted.




It might be summer but we're still here! MCC Toastmasters meetings are presently held in the Brighton Room, unless otherwise specified, and start at 4:45 pm.
