Why Walk/Run for Water?

n South Sudan, women and children walk up to 8 hours a day for water that they must carry home on their backs in jerry cans or in large gourds. Some families have to walk twice daily for water. Once they reach a watering hole, the water is often stagnant and contaminated with disease causing parasites. Life doesn't have to be this hard for the people of South Sudan.

The Solution is Simple

There is plenty of water in aquifers underneath the dusty ground of Sudan. It only needs to be accessed by an organization like Water for South Sudan, Inc., which has drilled wells in South Sudan since 2005, bringing life-giving water to over 400,000 villagers. After the first Water for South Sudan, Inc. well was drilled, one elder villager said, "All this time, people have been dying and we have been sitting right on top of the water?"

What One Well Can Do

When a Water for South Sudan, Inc. well is drilled, the well becomes the center of life and the world changes:

- Women no longer have to travel up to eight hours a day for water leaving time for planting, harvesting, and preparing crops for more nutritious meals.
- More stable structures for schools and clinics can be built with handmade bricks.
- Children can spend their days in school instead of walking for hours to carry water home for their families.
- With water available, health clinics are possible, and simple sicknesses can be tended to.
- Markets will spring up around the well.
- Infant mortality and disease will be dramatically reduced.
- Life becomes much more community-centered.

Water for South Sudan and the Holocaust, Genocide, and Human Rights Project at Monroe Community College

The Holocaust, Genocide, and Human Rights Project is MCC's unique organization for telling the stories of the Holocaust and other genocides while transforming individuals to become advocates for human rights. The students of the Project have partnered with Water for South Sudan to raise over \$40,000 in the last six years.

Water for South Sudan, Inc. is a non-profit organization founded by Salva Dut, one of thousands of lost boys who, at age 11, survived Sudan's civil war by walking across Africa's harsh wilderness, dodging militia to reach safety in refugee camps. Nineteen years after arriving in the United States, he went back to Sudan to search for his father. His father had made it through the war only to be gravely ill from drinking contaminated water. Salva decided then he would find a way to make sure his father never had to drink contaminated water again. He spent the next few years building his not-for-profit Water for South Sudan, Inc.
