## Associate Professor to Professor

<u>Frank Ambrosio</u> – Engineering Technologies – First year at MCC 1977. BEET from Rochester Institute of Technology and A.A.S from Monroe Community College. Mr. Ambrosio's mastery of his subject through his writings has brought him both nationwide and worldwide recognition. Monroe Community College, the electrical engineering technology program and his students have benefited from Frank's knowledge of the subject matter he teaches and his real-life industrial experience. He has over 35 years of engineering course development and teaching experience in the field of digital electronics in the classroom and laboratory at MCC. Frank has authored and co-authored several publications in the field of digital electronics, microprocessors and microcomputers (textbooks, laboratory manuals, study guides and solution manuals.) Several of these publications have been translated into different languages and have been adopted throughout the world by two-year and four-year colleges and universities. Frank has served on many college-wide and departmental committees. A most recent example of Frank's dedication was his leadership in the successful ABET accreditation process for the electrical engineering technology program. He was also the leader of the Electrical Engineering Technology committee responsible for the development of the SUNY General Education Assessment Plan at MCC.

Marsha Bower – Health Professions – First year at MCC 1999. M.A. from The College at Brockport, B.S. and A.A.S. from Rochester Institute of Technology, and A.A.S. from Monroe Community College. Ms. Bower is an effective, resourceful, and well-respected teacher. She teaches a wide range of courses in the program, including the pre-clinical dental hygiene course and a full range of both didactic courses and the actual dental hygiene practice skills. She received the NISOD Award in 2003 and the Chancellor's Award in 2005. As a registered and licensed dental hygienist, Ms. Bower must complete a minimum of 24 continuing education hours every three years. In addition, she attends professional conferences and is active in the Dental Hygiene Educators Association. Ms. Bower was an integral member of the dental team which created the distance learning Dental Assisting and Hygiene programs, the first in the country to be accredited by the American Dental Educators Association. She has been a Faculty Senator, served as a member of the Faculty Senate Professional Development Committee, is a member of the Dental Studies Advisory Board, and serves as a Military Mentor.

<u>Donna Burke</u> – Counseling, International and Veterans Services – First year at MCC 1995. M.Ed. from Columbia University, Teachers College, and B.S. from SUNY Cortland. Ms. Burke began her career at Monroe Community College in the Admissions Office. As the Associate Director during the College's transition to the new Banner platform, she was instrumental in its implementation and shared her mastery of Banner with other institutions via her presentations at SunGard's Northeast Regional Banner Training. She was a consistent presence in the Rochester community, attending area high school College Nights, presenting at the Annual New York State Associate of Admissions Counselors, and working with students and their families through SUNY College Fairs, MCC Open Houses, Adult Information Nights, and Instant Decision Days.

In addition, she provided advisement to the Monroe Advantage Program population and home-schooled students. In 2009, Ms. Burke accepted the position of Assistant to the Vice President of Academic Services, where her work was directed toward faculty needs and development. She assisted with numerous divisional projects, developed an Outlook calendaring system for department chairs, worked with academic student grievances, and interfaced with a variety of internal and external constituencies. She produced Academic Services' Annual Report, was responsible for the administration of the Student Opinion of Course and Faculty Survey, and planned a commemoration ceremony for SUNY China 150 participants. Following her passion for a direct service role to students, Ms. Burke accepted the position of Counselor in the Counseling and Advising Center in 2011. She is a master counselor, having completed an educational repertoire of professional development and growth seminars, which include alcohol and chemical dependency counseling skills, certification in Critical Incident Stress Management Crisis Debriefing, Unity Hospital's Best Practices Seminar Series, and DePaul's National Council of Alcoholism and Drug Dependence Training. Ms. Burke served as Counseling and Advising's liaison for the Next Generation Learning Challenge Grant. In addition, she secured a Foundation Grant to implement a College Orientation Seminar (COS) course for high school seniors with learning disabilities via Webster High School; the success of this program led to other area high schools enrolling their students at MCC or offering COS 101 as dual credit. She continues as an active participant on numerous division- and College-wide committees and initiatives, and has served for the past two years as Faculty Senate Secretary. Ms. Burke further developed her leadership skills by completing MCC's Leadership Academy and Chair Academy.

**Rory Butler** – Information Computer Technologies – First year at MCC 1997. M.S. from SUNY Binghamton, M.A. from The College at Brockport, B.S. from Empire State College, and A.A.S from Monroe Community College. In his 15+ years of teaching, Mr. Butler has consistently enhanced his teaching skills. She has implemented many teaching techniques; she was an early adopter of online teaching and has become a mentor to others in her department. She has participated in a variety of professional development activities including in-house programming by the TCC as well as attending external conferences and technology training. Ms. Belair contributes greatly to the effective functioning of the AHPS department. She has served in the past as Department Chair, was recently the Chair of the department's RTP committee, and has served as an assessment liaison. She is dedicated to the mission of the college and works with energy and enthusiasm to support her colleagues.

<u>Maria Brandt</u> – English/Philosophy – First year at MCC 2003. Ph.D. and M.A. from Boston College and B.A. from Providence College. He is an active faculty member who has engaged many high impact practices including Service Learning and Learning Communities. Mr. Dunning remains active in his own scholarship as evidenced by his many presentations and publications; he was recognized in 2009 with the NISOD award. He has been involved in the English/Philosophy department's RTP committee for several years and has served on the PHLENG Committee and Humanities Committee. Mr. Dunning has been extensively involved in the Teaching and Creativity Center and has been a key player for the TCC on the Damon City Campus. He has worked with the AmeriCorps program and been involved in the New York State Council of Humanities.

Her passion for multicultural initiatives is evident through her development of and ongoing work with the Model United Nations Program and course, and her Multicultural Center involvement. She serves as a Global Union Co-advisor and has been instrumental in the College's International Students Orientation and Dialogues on Diversity Programs, Foreign Film Festival, and President Obama's Interfaith and Community Service Project. In her role as a teaching professional, she has worked as an adjunct in the Visual and Performing Arts Department and teaches Leadership Development Seminars.
