Student Escapes Syrian War, Begins Building New Future at MCC

His first goal was to escape the Syrian civil war. In June 2013, that goal was realized when Hachiar Mohammed finally joined his wife Amel, an MCC accounting student, and their newborn son in this country. Hachiar's next goal was to earn a college credential in two years and get a good job to support his family. Accomplishing that goal is already paying off.

A former freelance journalist, Hachiar took the advice of an MCC counselor who guided him toward a future in information technology. "For the last two years, I was a full-time student, working 45 to 47 hours per week at Wegmans and in MCC's Math Learning Center," he said. "MCC gave me a lot of confidence."

Prior to his May 2015 graduation, Hachiar attended an MCC career fair and was hired as a technician with Kodak Alaris. He continues to balance work and family life while pursuing a degree in computer information technology at Rochester Institute of Technology. "The people who come to

MCC are trying to improve their lives. My teachers were very supportive," he said.

Hachiar and Amel are now saving to buy their first home in Rochester. "As an immigrant, I needed the support I received from MCC," he said.

International Student Enrollment on the Rise

Over the last several years, MCC has maintained a steady enrollment of approximately 100 students from other countries. However, with the opening of the Global Education and International Services Office at MCC, the numbers are beginning to increase. In fall 2015 MCC received 165 applications, up from 123 in fall 2014. Of those, 95 students were accepted and 56 registered for fall courses, an increase of 38 acceptances and 15 additional registered
