Realizing that these experiences are valuable and may parallel college-level course work, MCC provides the opportunity to verify and document your knowledge—and receive credit for it towards your college degree.

Through one or more of the three methods described below, MCC can measure your level of competency and determine if you are eligible for college credit.

- College-Level Examination Program (CLEP)
- DANTES
- MCC Departmental (Proficiency) Examinations

1. College-Level Examination Program (CLEP)

There are many ways to become an educated person. Going to college is one of them, of course. However, there is no rule that says all of your education must be done in the classroom or in college. In fact, there is a way that you can prove you have learned the equivalent of some college subjects. The College Level Examination Program (CLEP), used to evaluate non-traditional college education, is based on the premise that learning should be recognized regardless of how it is acquired.

You can take CLEP exams and earn college credit—up to a total of 30 credits or more!

Here's how it works: The College Entrance Examination Board has developed a computer-based testing program with examinations that are used to measure general educational background knowledge and understanding of fundamental facts and basic principles.

There are two types of examinations. Five **General Examinations**, which provide a comprehensive measure of undergraduate achievement in five basic areas of liberal arts, and **Subject Examinations**, which measure achievement in specified undergraduate courses. All versions are 90-minute multiple choice examinations. The General English exam with essay is 90 minutes in length (45 minutes is allotted for a multiple choice exam and 45 minutes for the essay portion of the exam).

2. DANTES Program

The DANTES Testing Program is a nationally recognized testing program that affords individuals the opportunity to receive college credit for learning acquired outside the traditional college classroom. You can choose from over 30 Subject Standardized tests. DANTES offers tests in a wide variety of subject areas that typically CLEP does not cover.
