

SUITE FEATURES

COMPUTER AND NETWORK CONNECTIVITY

Every bedroom is pre-wired with an Ethernet networking jack which provides connectivity to the College's network (double rooms have two data ports). You will also receive a student e-mail account. Bring your own computer, with Ethernet capabilities, to access these services from your bedroom. Wireless internet service is available in Canal Hall as well as on the Brighton campus in designated buildings.



CABLE TV

Access to cable TV service is available in each bedroom and suite living room. Bring your own television. Community televisions are also available in the common rooms of each building. A cable hook up is located for each resident and in the living room. Basic cable is provided free of charge to all hook ups. Residents must call Time Warner to upgrade services for an additional fee.

Access to local phone service is available to all residents.

The College has an outstanding security record. This comes from our excellent Public Safety staff and procedures, as well as features like secure card access readers, blue emergency phone stations and 24-hour Public Safety surveillance around campus.

Safety is everyone's responsibility. Look out for yourself and others and they'll do the same for you. Report any unusual, dangerous, illegal, harassing, or otherwise unsafe behaviors to your RD, RA or Public Safety.

Each suite has smoke detectors which are linked to a central system monitored by Public Safety. Other safety features include heat-activated sprinkler system, metal doors on each suite, and cement walls and ceilings separating each unit for fire safety. Secure card access allows entry for the residents of that building only, and separate keys are issued for suite and bedroom. Each residence hall has surveillance cameras outside as well as inside the buildings.

POLICIES

COMMUNITY BEHAVIOR

MCC's mission is to provide a center for learning for all of its students, therefore we believe in free inquiry and free expression. Students are encouraged to develop the capacity for critical judgment and to learn about themselves and others. The freedom to learn depends upon appropriate, safe, non-prejudiced, opportunities and conditions in the classroom, on the campus, and in the larger community. Students should respect this environment and act with civility, courteousness, responsibility and sobriety.



SMOKING

The residence halls are smoke-free buildings. Smoking is allowed outdoors in designated smoking areas only.

ALCOHOL

MCC is a DRY CAMPUS. NO ALCOHOL IS ALLOWED in the residence halls or anywhere on campus.

PETS

Small five-gallon fish aquariums are permitted (one per resident). No other pets are permitted in the residence halls.

GUESTS

Suitemates should discuss visitation of guests and arrive at an agreement acceptable to all residents of the suite.

Overnight guests of the same or opposite sex are permitted, but may not reside in any suite for more than three days in any given two-week period. Guests may not use the resident's keys or swipe card. Guests must be accompanied by their host at all times and hosts are responsible for the actions of their guest(s). All guests must have a valid photo ID (driver's license, work/college ID). No persons under the age of 18 are permitted in the halls without approval from a Resident Director.

PARKING FOR RESIDENCE HALLS

Designated parking is provided for the residence halls. Parking permits can be purchased at the Campus Center service desk.

HALL OPENINGS/CLOSINGS

The residence halls open the day prior to classes beginning for the Fall and Spring semesters. Halls are closed during College breaks.* Residents are required to vacate the residence halls 24 hours following their last final exam.

ROOMMATE SELECTION

Residents are placed into suites based upon answers provided on the housing application. You may request a roommate on the application, however, both parties will need to mutually request each other and we will attempt to honor the request.

ELIGIBILITY

A student must be full-time each semester to reside in the residence halls. "Full-time" is defined as twelve (12) course hours or more (including hours added during the drop-add period). Room assignments generally will be made on the basis of the date the contract agreement and deposit are received as well as the student's status e.g., matriculation and registration for full-time. Specific eligibility requirements are listed on the application/agreement. Proof of Health Insurance and Immunizations are required.

You must be admitted to the College to be considered for a placement in the halls. Applications for Admission can be found at www.monroecc.edu/go/admissions. The Residence Hall Application process is separate from the admissions application. For a Residence Hall Application and instructions for filing, visit www.monroecc.edu/go/housing.

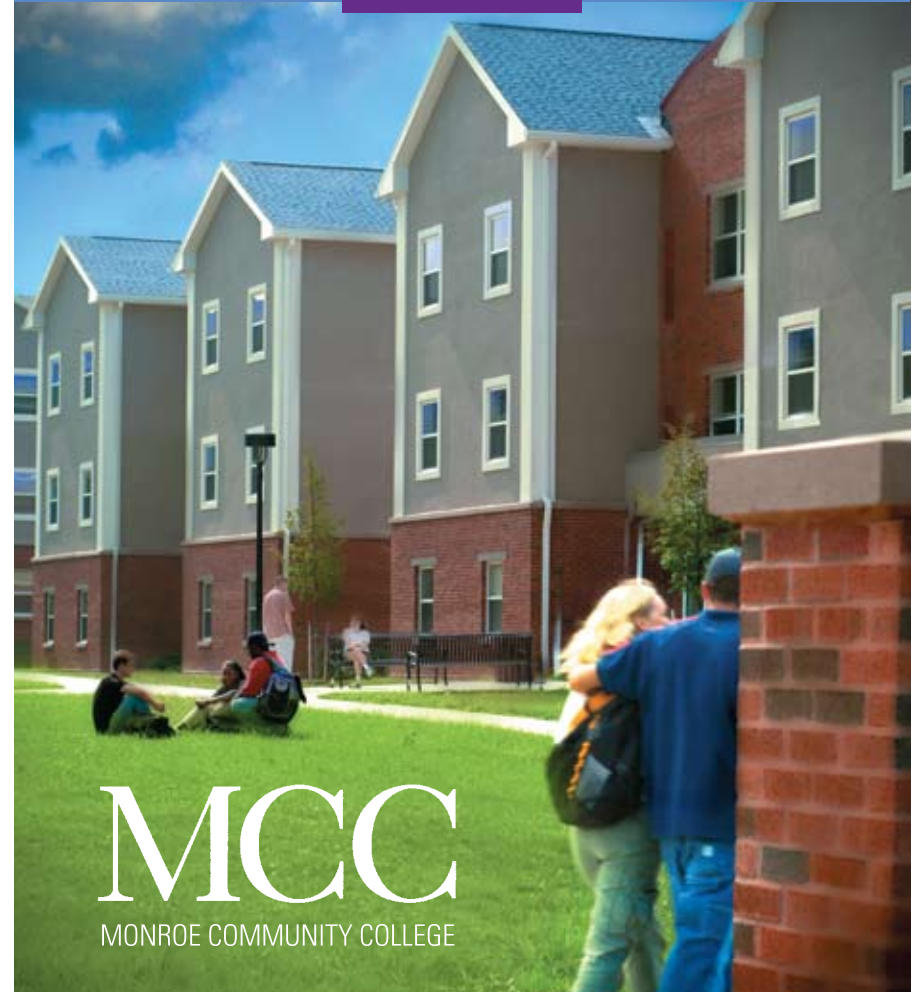
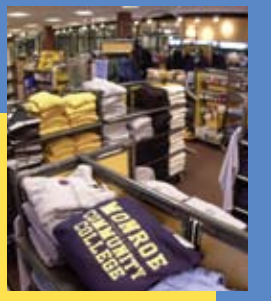

LIVING & LEARNING

RESIDENCE HALL LIFE

Living, learning, working, socializing and dining with your suitemates and friends. Imagine a community where you'll experience a variety of new ideas, new opportunities and meet a mix of new friends.



As a resident, you can conveniently attend classes, take advantage of being near the learning centers and the library, as well as access comprehensive services outside the classroom. Co-curricular programs and activities, sporting events and cultural performances held in the evenings and on weekends are just a quick walk across campus.



The residence halls are located on the north end of MCC's Brighton Campus, near our Childcare Center and are on the busline. The entire complex has a total of 772 beds among four buildings. The halls are secure buildings, accessible only by swipe ID card readers.

Residents live in 4- or 5- person suites, each about 1,100 square feet. Halls are co-ed with single-sex suites. All suites are air conditioned.

Residence halls are more than just a place to live; they make an already great education even better. Living in a residence hall will open up a new world of social and intellectual opportunities and be the beginning of many lasting friendships. Experience for yourself the difference of living and learning at Monroe Community College.



GENERAL INFORMATION

Students registered full time (12 credits) at any MCC campus are eligible to apply for housing.



The MCC Residence Hall complex consists of 772 beds located in four buildings: Pioneer Hall, Alexander Hall, Tribune Hall and Canal Hall. Each suite is approximately 1,100 sq. ft. All halls have a Common area with a cable television, furniture and vending machines. Canal, Pioneer and Tribune Halls each have a pool table and Alexander Hall has a foosball table.

Resident Directors (RD's) supervise the daily operation of the buildings and the Resident Assistants (RA's). There is at least one RA on each floor of each building. The RA's serve as a liaison between the students and professional RD's.

All buildings are non-smoking and substance free. No alcohol is permitted regardless of age.

Each student is issued a mailbox with a key access and all mail and packages are delivered to the residence halls.

Application to the residence halls is separate from the Admissions process (however, you must be admitted to the College to be considered for a placement in the halls). For a Residence Hall Application and instructions for filing, visit www.monroecc.edu/go/housing.

THE SUITE LIFE

Suites are either 4-person (four singles or two double rooms) or 5-person (2 doubles and 1 single).



Suites are fully furnished. All rooms are carpeted except the bathroom and kitchen. The living room has a full couch, two chairs, coffee table and two end tables. Bedrooms have height-adjustable, extra-long twin beds, closet wardrobes, night stands, and computer desks and chairs. Kitchens have a stove, dishwasher, microwave, pantry, refrigerator and some include garbage disposals.



Air conditioning and heating is controlled within the units. Each suite has 2 bathrooms, with a convenience counter in the hallway (Pioneer, Alexander and Tribune counters have sinks). Each unit has a storage closet. Coin-operated washers and dryers are available in each residence hall.

The residence halls are co-ed floors by suite; units are separated by gender thus a male suite could be next door to a female suite on the same floor.



This is a typical 4-person suite, with four single bedrooms.*

**NOTE: There are a few 4-person suites that feature two double bedrooms.*



This is a typical 5-person suite. The two larger bedrooms are doubles, and the smaller bedroom is a single bedroom.

STUDENT SERVICES

RESIDENCE HALL STAFF

You are never alone. There is always someone on staff available to assist you.



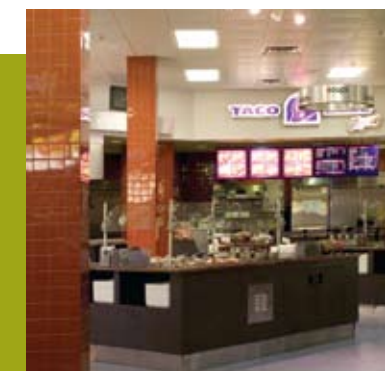
Resident Directors (RD's) are full-time, professional staff members who live in each building. RD offices are located on the first floor as you enter the building. RD's are responsible for the daily operations of the hall and provide educational programming. Residence Directors work with Resident Assistants and students to establish and maintain community in the residence halls. Students bring ideas for fun and new learning experiences—RD's and RA's help make it happen.

Resident Assistants (RA's) are full-time students who live in the residence halls. RA's are there to assist students with everyday issues, to be a resource for residents, provide educational and social programs, enforce policy in the halls, and help create a sense of community on the floors and in the halls. Night Desk Attendants, (NDA's) are part-time, work-study students who are not required to live in the halls (but there is a preference for residence hall students). NDA's sign in guests in the evening.



Community Assistants (CA's) are full-time students who assist the RA on the floor with programs and community development. They may put up bulletin boards, door decorations, post bulletins, and assist with Night Desk Attendant duties.

DINING



Since each suite is equipped with a kitchen — including a full-sized refrigerator, stove, microwave (in most units), garbage disposal and dishwasher — students are encouraged to take advantage of planning and cooking their own meals. There are a number of supermarkets nearby on the bus routes and the bookstore located in the Campus Center sells a variety of convenience food items. There are dining options and plans available through Aramark, the College's food and beverage

service. Dining facilities are located on campus and offer a selection of menu choices. Vending machines are located throughout the buildings around campus. There are cafés and juice bars located throughout the campus.

RECREATION & ACTIVITIES

There are numerous outdoor activities and clubs on campus and the Rochester region provides ample opportunity for activities year round. From snowboarding to swimming to a myriad of festivals, concerts and museums, you will have plenty to do. On campus, residents have access to the Human Performance Lab — a state-of-the-art workout facility — as well as the new PAC Center field house, two gymnasiums, lighted tennis courts and an Olympic-sized swimming pool.
