ESPN Analyst and Bestselling Author Jay Williams is considered one of the most prolific college basketball players in history. The #2 pick in the 2002 NBA Draft, Williams is an analyst on *College GameDay* and a regular commentator on ESPN and ESPN2's weeknight studio coverage.

Following a motorcycle accident in 2003, Williams was forced to retire from basketball after just one season with the Chicago Bulls. Rather than letting the near-fatal accident destroy his future, Williams parlayed his experience on the court into a successful career in broadcasting and business. Drawing from his time in recovery and building his brand, Williams has established himself as a premier keynote motivational speaker for various executive business conferences and charitable organizations nationwide.

His best-selling memoir, *Life is Not an Accident: A Memoir of Reinvention*, focuses on the lifealtering depression and ultimate healing that Williams underwent in the aftermath of his accident. The 2018 documentary web-series, *Best Shot*, follows Williams as he mentors high school basketball players from Newark's Central High School.
