- MCC Veteran Services received a gift of \$15,000 from the Rochester Veterans Business Council to be used for scholarships for military-affiliated students.

Programming

Technology Services' rollout of Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) was completed on April 11, ahead of schedule and with minimal issues. MFA is required by SUNY for MCC to participate in the D2L Brightspace project replacing our Learning Management System, Blackboard. It is also required by our Cyber Insurance carrier to maintain coverage. MFA is also required by the GLBA law (Gramm-Leach-Bliley), with which MCC must comply to be allowed to administer Federal Student Aid to our students. According to cyber security experts, including the SUNY Chief Information Security Officer, MFA is the single most important step we can take towards securing our environments from cyber-attack. Many thanks to the team for their creativity, persistence and hard work over many months, delivering these outstanding results which protect the college's systems and data.

• Emergency Operations Center Incident Update – As a response to the recent shooting in Buffalo, NY, we want the college community to understand MCC is prepared to respond to emergencies including active shooter acts on our campuses. Public Safety Peace Officers are prepared to immediately respond to a scene of a shooting and try to stop and/or eliminate the threat. Campus Peace Officers would most likely be first responders followed by local police agencies who would also immediately respond similarly, and then begin assuming control and eventually take charge. Public Safety Chief Piro and Assistant Chief Ferguson would be at the Incident Command Post commencing recovery operations with Chuck DiSalvo serving as EOC Manager at the MCC Emergency Operations Center.

Programming

- SUNY awarded three MCC students, Isabella DeRubeis, Jillian (Jason) Jeneault, and Naomi Taggart, with the 2022 Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence (CASE), the highest honor awarded to SUNY students for academic excellence and leadership.
- The Phi Theta Kappa student leaders welcomed 210 new 2022-2023 PTK members. Over 200 family and friends celebrated with them during the April 28 induction ceremony, with MCC and PTK Alumni Chloe Vazzana as the keynote speaker. The chapter received Most Distinguished Honors in Action Research Poster at the New York Region Convention in March. In addition, Paula Barlow was elected the Vice President for the Western District.

Economic Development and Innovative Workforce Services (EDIWS)

Months of May & June 2022

Programming

- The FWD Center received equipment to support education in Industry 4.0 technologies such as: Smart Factory System, 3D Printers, and a Mini Mill CNC Machine. Students enrolled in Hydraulics and Pneumatics and Mechatronics have already started using the 3D printers for their final projects.
- EDIWS has been working in partnership with RIT on Augmented Reality/Virtual Reality (AR/VR) technologies and has been officially awarded a \$299,907, 3-year grant to begin planning and implementing AR/VR technologies to support learning CNC Machining in a virtual environment. This grant will allow the College to revitalize the precision machining program and align with the newest i4.0 technologies; particularly with the use of AR/VR technology.
