In 2017-2018, approximately half of Monroe Community College's 15,600 students enrolled in degree and certificate programs relied on public funding to attend college. Federal and state grants only go so far, leaving students and families struggling to cover the full cost to attend, including books, housing, food, child care, etc.

MCC Foundation Launches \$50 Million Campaign for Scholarships

Scholarships make a significant difference to MCC students— impacting students' abilities to earn a degree or certificate in a timely manner and with little to no debt. In 2017-2018 alone, 3,058 students applied for MCC Foundation scholarships, but less than one-third received the philanthropic support they needed.

On October 1, the Foundation announced its \$50 million *Every Bright Future Needs a Strong Foundation* campaign. One of the largest ever pursued by a community college, the campaign will engage alumni, corporate partners, private foundations, past benefactors and others to help ensure all students have access to the scholarship

To date, \$39.5 million has been raised. The total includes alumni Robin '80 and Timothy '80 Wentworth's historic \$4 million gift that was announced in conjunction with the campaign launch. The Wentworths serve as the campaign's honorary chairs. (See article below.)

Wentworths Give Back to MCC, Rochester

Robin and Timothy Wentworth's \$4 million gift to the MCC Foundation, the largest in the college's history, will expand the Wentworth Family Endowed Scholarship program at MCC to provide full scholarships to 100 MCC students each year. The gift surpasses the Wentworth's previous gift of \$2.25 million.

As Timothy Wentworth said to an audience of alumni, students, employees and supporters at the Every Bright Future Needs a Strong Foundation campaign launch, "MCC opens doors that might otherwise be closed to talented students. Robin and I know firsthand the value of scholarships and the MCC experience. We are changing the lives of others through our involvement in MCC and our investment in scholarships."

With her sights set on earning her associate degree and transferring to Nazareth College in 2019, Victoria is determined to avoid taking out student loans. Through her work in MCC's financial aid and student life offices, Victoria knows overcoming financial barriers, including food insecurity, is a major challenge for some MCC students.

"As soon as I started school here, I changed," Victoria said. "I found out I love being organized and having a plan. ... I always wanted some sort of independence. MCC is helping me transition."

Depending on a student's housing choice, the cost of an MCC education is approximately \$13,000 to \$17,600 per year for New York state residents. The estimated cost includes tuition, fees, books/supplies, transportation, housing and food.



For the fifth consecutive year, the MCC Foundation awarded more than \$1 million in scholarships to MCC students in 2017-2018.
