

In 1994, Paul Rusesabagina (pictured at left) used his charm and sales skills to save 1,268 lives during the Rwandan genocide. Under his leadership, the Hotel des Mille Collines became the only public place where people were safe. Paul's story has been told in the film Hotel Rwanda and his autobiography *An Ordinary Man*. In March, he will share his story at Monroe Community College.
