Your outstanding training will appear on the MyTraining page. Be sure to click on the button that says "Complete Training" to get credit for the training. Once your training is complete, confetti will appear on screen with the message: "You have completed all of your training! Keep an eye on your inbox for upcoming assignments." You will also receive an email at completion of each module from KnowBe4. Once you have completed all your assigned training courses, your password expiration will be reset back to normal within 2 business days.

Designing and Using Rubrics

MCC students have reported that rubrics help them understand how to do well because they provide an answer to the "what are you looking for?" question. A well-designed rubric can clarify assignment expectations, encourage students to evaluate their own work against your rubric criteria, streamline your grading process, and make your evaluation process more transparent and consistent. In this workshop, you will learn the fundamentals of rubric design, as well as construct or refine a rubric that is aligned with one of your existing assignments. Rubrics work well for scoring student work, ranging from small homework assignments to complex capstone portfolios, and we'll provide examples of different types of rubrics and explain the contexts in which each type can work best. Workshop facilitators will also provide an overview of AAC&U VALUE rubrics, which you can use or adapt for use in your own courses or for various assessment projects. You'll leave with rubric templates and with good ideas for using rubrics for improving student learning. Workshop participants are encouraged to bring assignment instructions and a rubric (if one exists, even in draft form) because there will be time to review and refine rubrics (or start designing one) during the workshop.

The ways in which information is now produced and disseminated online has made misinformation more prevalent than ever and has inspired MCC librarians to reconsider our approach to teaching source evaluation. Research shows that evaluation methods that emphasize vertical reading (i.e., evaluating a source using only the information the website itself provides you) are ineffective compared to strategies that stress lateral reading (i.e., investigating what others say about the source). Come to this session to get hands-on practice with lateral reading-inspired evaluation methods and explore ways in which you might incorporate them into your work with students.

Supporting Faculty and Staff in Identifying, Responding to, and Referring a Student Who Is At Risk of a Mental Health Crisis

8am-9pm

Presenter: Morgan Kennell (Counseling and Disability Services)

The Counseling Center staff recognize that students are particularly vulnerable this year, and that faculty and staff often function as the first point of contact/triage when a student begins to struggle. We invite faculty and staff to join us to learn more about ways to identify, respond to, and refer a student who is in distress or at risk of a mental health crisis. This 60-minute workshop will include gatekeeper training skills, as well as information sharing about resources that are both internal and external to the college.

Some frequently asked questions will be answered, such as: How do I respond to a concerning email that a student sent me after hours? What do I do or say if I'm the first point of contact interacting with a student who is feeling suicidal? How do I handle a conversation about confidentiality if a student tells me something in private and I know I need to refer them elsewhere for support? What are some helpful communication strategies that could be used to de-escalate a situation? As a faculty/staff member, what are some common warning signs that I should look out for that may indicate that a student might be at risk of a mental health crisis?

After a brief PowerPoint presentation, a panel of mental health counselors will take questions from the audience about how to practically apply some of the content reviewed. Additionally, audience members will leave with several resource lists for use with their student population.

In spring 2019, MCC was one of only four community colleges in the nation to receive the Single Moms Success Design Challenge (SMSDC) grant.
