DNA kits have gained lots of interest in the last decade about people wanting to know more about their origin. Ancestry DNA, 23andMe, MyHeritage, Living DNA, Geno 2.0 how do you choose? Which kit is the right one for you? These tests are based on science, but if you don't know exactly what you're doing you may end up taking the wrong test. Genealogy Speaker Richard Hill in his presentation "Understanding the Ethnic Ancestry in Your DNA Test" will shed some light on this topic and provide examples on each of the DNA test from the different companies. Richard Hill was the first adoptee known to have identified his birth family through genetic genealogy DNA tests. He answers thousands of DNA questions annually.
