ity and forced into bondage as slaves, the long and dangerous road to freedom didn't have any tour guides. As slaves made their way north, praying for and dreaming of a better life...a

free life...the stars were their guides and in the years to come folk songs captured the feelings of the journey along that long road.

On this beautiful summer day nearly 100 people gathered for the dedication of Sodus Point's third historic mural, located on the east wall of the fire department. Through the sponsorship of the Neighbor-

hood Association of Sodus Point and the generosity of private donors, the magnificent mural depicting the history of the Underground Railroad in Sodus Point has been brought to life. NASP President and local historian, Bruce Farrington, greeted the large crowd and began the festivities by playing a ballad performed by the New

Christy Minstrels in the 1960's. Farrington explained that what we know as the Big Dipper constellation in the night sky was referred to as "the drinking gourd" by the slaves on their

way north, guiding them to freedom.

He gave hearty and sincere thanks to the members of the Sodus Point Highway Department, who have been instrumental in getting the three historical murals mounted at the fire department. Farrington also noted that if it hadn't been for the stories shared by long-time Sodus Point residents George Arney and Elsie Parsons, the story of the role of Sodus Point in the Underground Railroad's operation may never have been told.
