

Stevan Veljkovic: The primary experience of the conference is one of elevation, of coming into contact with something larger than oneself. It offers a direct experience of something that is generally abstract. The abstraction evaporates when one is standing in the Great Hall. Vague notions of a diplomat's job drift away after a week of simulating that work. Prejudices are replaced by the lessons of direct participation.

Students' engagement bridges the academic and the practical--building critical and creative thinking and essential leadership and communication skills--all in a global context. Our Model UN delegates work with and compete against peers from throughout the country, adding depth and richness to their educational experience. Students' newfound confidence and perspective benefit them throughout college and into the workplace. Each day, it becomes clearer that we live in an increasingly complex world--whether considering the international economy or geopolitical relations. The Model UN provides a unique chance for students to extend their horizons, expand their learning, and have an amazing time while doing both!

The Program:

This unique program allows students to step into the shoes of ambassadors from United Nations member states, and to debate current issues on the organization's vast agenda. Student "delegates" prepare draft resolutions, plan strategies, negotiate with supporters and adversaries, resolve conflicts, and navigate the U.N.'s rules of procedures - all in the interest of mobilizing "international cooperation" to resolve problems that affect almost every country in the world.

Before assuming their diplomatic roles in the Model U.N., students research global problems to be addressed from today's headlines. Model U.N. participants learn how the international community acts on its concerns about topics including peace and security, human rights, the environment, food and hunger, economic development and globalization.

Why MCC Students Should Consider the Model UN Program:

Nothing engages students in the details of global issues, politics and leadership as well as the Model United Nations Program. Participants, who research a country and its issues in great depth, are then required to defend their positions and argue these same issues before their peers and fellow delegates. Students cannot help but come away from the conference with a new and powerful understanding of the complexities of the world.

This award-winning course is offered each spring semester; however, students start preparing during the fall semester. The program/course is very competitive and students apply for the program through a process of application, attending an informational session and an interview. Therefore, not everyone who applies to the program can be accepted. Our program/course provides the student with a comprehensive experience of curricular and co-curricular learning.

Consider This!

You'll earn four (4) Political Science, Social Science, or General Elective credits by successfully completing this course. Although POS-234 is a writing-intensive honors course, you do not have to be in the honors program to be accepted into the Model U.N. Program, but you will receive writing intensive/honors credit.

You'll have the opportunity to attend and participate in the largest national and international collegiate conference in the Northeast with 4,000 students from all over the world. The conference is held in New York City for one week; this year from April 19th to April 24th during MCC's 2011 spring break.

Consider the leadership skills you will gain by taking this course, such as the art of negotiation, enhancing your oral and written communication skills, problem solving, critical thinking, decision making, conflict resolution and team building skills that will enhance your personal growth. Not only will this course be included on your academic transcript, but will also be applicable for your co-curricular transcript and leadership certificate if you so choose.

Students will work through the course as a team, using a non-traditional approach to learning. In the role of diplomats, they learn the art of group dynamics and multi-lateral diplomacy through the complexities of international relations.

The course is taught by four faculty members from different departments and disciplines, giving the student not only different perspectives on topics, but an array of experiential educational experiences. The Model U.N. faculty members strive to formulate learning experiences that stretch students' leadership skills and encourage them to examine their own beliefs, contrasting them with the opinions and beliefs of people in other countries. Faculty members encourage students to think outside the box. With a multitude of viewpoints on any given situation, policy or belief, students come to understand why those different viewpoints exist.
