MCC Service-Learning travels to The Big Easy for community development, post-natural disaster, during intersession.

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The Epic Tale of: Harry Hygiene During this upcoming intersession, MCC's Center for Service-Learning is offering a unique and exciting trip to New Orleans, Louisiana. With the destructive aftermath of numerous hurricanes, including Katrina and Rita, lingering in the neighborhoods of New Orleans, there has been a national call to service to rebuild affordable housing and strengthen neighborhood communities.

MCC's Service-Learning Program will answer that call. For one week in January 2010, a group of nine service-learners will travel to the bayou state and join in the effort to help rebuild New Orleans, by building one housing unit. In order to fulfill

the academic piece to this service project, the nine service-learners are required to participate in the course SVL-106: Topics in Service-Learning Habitat New Orleans. Beginning in November, this seven and a half week course will cover everything the project New Orleans students need to know about community development in a post natural disaster environment. Then, come January, this dedicated team of service-learners will take to the


skies and head down to New Orleans to begin their service. The project requires 45 hours of on-site, hands-on service. MCC service-learners will build a simple, family-style home for a Katrina victim. MCC Service-Learning has partnered with the New Orleans Area Habitat for Humanity in order to make this project possible. This trip is funded in part by Rochester Help to New Orleans (R-H2NO).

Enhancing Educational Tools with PathStone, Inc.

PathStone's on-line financial education program, "Seeds of Success," is updated and enhanced by MCC Service-Learners

The PathStone corporation is a not-for-profit community development and human service organization that strives to empower individuals, families and communities to attain economic and social resources for building better lives. PathStone (formerly Rural Opportunities, Inc.) strengthens farm worker, rural, and urban communities and promotes social justice. Sharing not only a passion for service, but also a notable historic landlord, MCC Service-Learning has had a strong partnership with PathStone for several years.

This time around, the

PathStone corporation is partnering with ECO 103 and BUS 110, professors Spinelli and Pettite, to update their on-line financial education program. Seeds of Success is a web-based learning tool for youth aged 12 and over (and adults) that promotes Financial Literacy and Entrepreneurship. Through a series of interactive lessons and activities students are able to acquire information, pursue individual interests and generate personal plans for action. There are two main learning tracks: Mastering Money (personal management) and Learning to Earn (career-focused decision

making).


Service-Learners in ECO 103 and BUS 110 will work in groups and go through each lesson to examine how current and accurate it is, by fact-checking information and reporting dead links.

Service-Learners will then develop suggestions for new activities, information, and related links to be added to the curriculum.

Each lesson is mirrored in Spanish and will be reviewed and updated accordingly. The newly refurbished *Seeds of Success* curriculum will be of great benefit to the PathStone Corporation and the people who use it as a platform for advancement. Making Nutrition Count!

For many, it is difficult to think back to a time when there were no Wegmans' or Wal-marts. Universal access to the produce marketplace continues to grow and expand all over the world, along with individual access to nutritional information. Yet, with all this information at our fingertips, we are still encountering major issues with communal awareness and malnutrition. Why? Because there is an important difference between making information available and actually putting it to good use.

This year, Professor Chris Inya is partnering with the Northeast Area Development to help increase nutritional awareness in the Rochester community. Students in his Microeconomics course will perform detailed evaluations of local grocery stores and supermarkets using the N-EMS instrument.

N-EMS stands for Nutrition Environment Measures Survey, it is a tool developed by the University of Rochester to rate the nutrition environments of grocery selling establishments. "It is a very empowering tool" the goal of which "is to inform people, and help them make choices of the better food to buy" says Inya. Based on a detailed scoring system, the N-EMS instrument compares a variety of different factors to assess the most accurate nutritional information in foods that people buy. This tool looks at brand, availability, shelf-life, price, fat-content and quality of a variety of items all across the traditional food pyramid. The scores are then tallied and each store is graded on a scale of 0-50, with 50 being a perfect score.

Professor Inya's students will spend 20 hours, of service, investigating the nutrition environment of the Northeast area of Rochester, NY. They will explore local corner stores, Goodman Plaza, and the Public Market. The service-learners will choose approximately 4 items each, from a list arranged by U of R doctors, and will examine the quality of those

items at each specified location. The data collected by the students will be compiled into a report to be presented to George Moses, the community coordinator at N.E.A.D. The North East Area Development will then use this information to explore the benefits of the Public Market, both nutritionally and economically. The results will also be used for neighborhood development, planning, and as a resource for grant writing.

Professor Inya said that at first his students were hesitant to embrace this project, but after entering the community and applying their knowledge "Now their eyes are open! They were impressed!" Inya had many reasons for giving his students the chance to participate in such an exciting project. "It's not enough to

talk about it in class, but to go out and do it. Students who have not taken service-learning don't realize the link between the classroom theory, the application, and the benefits that the application provides to the community." Inya says that those students who do complete a service-learning course "don't question the connection anymore."

According to Professor Inya, "the ultimate direction of this project is to assess the nutritional information in foods people buy and use the results to change eating habits and reduce the high incidence of obesity" and if his students can at least "help you make informed nutritional choices, well that's a good start!"



Professor Tracy Wyant of the EDU department is pioneering a newly developed service-learning project in her course EDU 150: Performance and Presentation Skills for Educators. Professor Wyant is instructing two sections of EDU 150 at the Damon City Campus this Fall of 2009. Her students are participating in a service project in which they create original stories, that focus on helping to develop childhood skills in literacy, positive social behavior and

healthy lifestyles through the use of motivational role models and inspirational thematic content. Wyant's service-learners can either perform their story as a short play, in a small group, or individually read their story to their audience. Originally, this course partnered with the Golisano Children's Hospital, as a performance venue. Unfortunately, due to the current H1N1 crisis, the Golisano partnership has been put on hold to be revisited

next semester. The students will be bringing their stories to life for the children of MCC's Childcare Center and the Jefferson Avenue Childhood Development Center. This project is emblematic of the EDU department's focus on enhancing the levels of Literacy in Rochester through academic based service.
