Culture in the Classroom

Curious whether one of your students is from another country and wonder the best way to ask?

- ☑ **Tip:** Before or after class share with your student that you are wondering if he or she is originally from another culture. In most cases our international and immigrant students are happy to share where they are from. In fact, most of them appreciate when others take time to show interest in them and their countries.
- ☑ **Tip¹:** Avoid asking, "Where are you from?" because it is ambiguous and potentially offensive. Many students with accents might have been born and raised in Rochester in a family that speaks their first language in the home and English outside the home.
- ☑ **Tip**²: Try asking, "How many students speak a second or third language?" while also sharing (or joking about) what languages (or words from languages) you speak (or don't speak so well). Then ask those that raise their hands to share what the additional languages are. That will generally prompt some of students to self-identify what country they are from. You might find using yourself first as an example (of not being able to master any second language) helps put the class at ease before you ask about other languages.
