Meeting called to order: 3:37 p.m.

1. Announcements:

The Executive Committee members expressed their sadness over the passing of Carmen Powers and would like to honor her and her contribution to the Faculty Senate. **Motion:** On behalf of the Professional Development Committee, H. Williams made a motion to rename the Legacy Series the Carmen Powers Legacy Series. **Motion seconded. Motion passed.**

2. Guest Speakers:

D. Jachim-Moore and V. Avalone - update on Integrated Planning and Resource Allocation

V. Avalone stated that the College was asked to turn in a progress report after the Periodic Review Report to Middle States, which has been completed and should receive feedback from the Commission by February. V. Avalone reported that reform that is sweeping through higher education, with a focus on increasing the numbers in retention and completion in order to ultimately increase the success and educational goal attainment for all community college students, and is being considered a mandate. Institutions are expected to use outcomesbased evidence and continuous quality improvement rooted in strategic planning and in compliance with accreditation standards, and to demonstrate accountability and institutional effectiveness through the use of integrated planning, assessment, and integrated resource allocation. Publicly funded institutions have been significantly impacted by reductions in state funding.

D. Jachim-Moore reviewed the specific factors that are affecting institutions state wide with regard to planning which included: state-aid in question, financial pressure on Sponsor contributions, student revenue shares increasing, flattening enrollment state-wide and chargeback rules under discussion. SUNY is asking for a 10% budget increase, which would include a state-aid \$260 per student FTE (2012 - \$150 FTE). The mid-year budget update is delayed this year due to Hurricane Sandy. All state departments have been asking to budget their departments flat since the state works to fund the disaster. The Governor's Executive Budget should be available in mid-January.

V. Avalone gave an update on the progression of planning at MCC, which is now ongoing and at best an expression of organizational learning. MCC's 2012-1016 Strategic Plan went into effect on September 1, 2012.

The Board of Trustees will receive periodic updates on key performance indicators linked to the plans beginning with baseline report shortly.

V. Avalone emphasized the importance of Integrated Planning and how it is basically the linking of vision, priorities, people, and physical institutions in a flexible system of evaluations, decision-making, and action. In order to fulfill accreditation requirements institutions are required to provide information describing current institutional planning and budget processes, with particular attention to demonstrating how such processes are integrated and linked.

In support of MCC's strategic plan, a number of operational, unit and divisional plans have or are being developed. They are basically to-do lists that are that are linked to the Strategic Plan with a 1-2 year timeframe. A few such plans at MCC include: Facility Master Plan, Enrollment Plan, Technology Plan, Sustainability Plan, Assessment Plan and Divisional Plans.

V. Avalone noted that budgeting alone is not effective planning. She explained the benefits of Integrated Planning, which include: Aligning institutional priorities with resources, make accreditations work for you, and contain and reduce costs.

V. Avalone stated that in an effort to assure that MCC is fully engaged in integrated planning and in service of improved institutional effectiveness, Dr. Kress has launched the Planning Coordination Council, a representative oversight group with membership drawn from the multiple planning entities across the college and from our shared governance stakeholder groups. The Coordination Council is designed to make sure each planning process understands how it relates to the others so that we are achieving the greatest collective impact on MCC's performance—as measured by reported metrics.

D. Jachim-Moore explained the progression of the work of the Budget Resource Committee (BRC) and the ever tightening link between budgeting and the Strategic Plan. Last year, the BRC made two primary recommendations that were linked directly to the Strategic Plan, Direction 1 – Learning First:

1. Create/develop a full-time cross-divisional position dedicated to the completion agenda

Status: Search now open for AVP - Strategic Enrollment; target start date is Feb. 2013

2. Engage independent consultant to address key student intake processes - up to \$290K for 2013.

For 2013, the fourth year of the BRC, the Committee reviewed all prior BRC recommendations for the status of their implementation. Committee sub-groups, each representing one Strategic Plan direction, then reviewed any recommendations that had not yet been fully implemented. This work resulted in identification of four recommendations to be carried forward for continued emphasis and priority. By design, these recommendations closely aligned with the following Strategic Plan Directions.

Direction One: Learning First

Direction Two: Workforce Education/Career Pathways

Direction Three: Partnerships

Direction Four: Effectiveness, Efficiency, Accountability

The Committee noted that its function in the budget process supports Direction Four the best and that from its perspective, effectiveness, efficiency and accountability relate closely to all the directions.

V. Avalone reviewed the new software that the college will be using to track the progress of the Strategic Plan called Compliance Assist. It is a fully integrated and comprehensive online solution, which provides innovative web solutions to organize and present planning and assessment reports.

V. Avalone reviewed the following important points of the presentation:

• There's a convergence taking place between: Planning (both strategic and operational) resource allocation, accreditation, and good sound management

• MCC is taking a proactive approach to preparing for our next accreditation cycle thru Integrated Planning and such things as the new Planning Coordination Council and Compliance Assist.

MCC can't just focus on just one year but needs to consider multiple years when making decisions.

The words: accountability, effectiveness, and efficiency are here to stay and are major factors critical to effective organizational planning.

A question was when V. Avalone will be looking for volunteers to sit on the next committee. V. Avalone explained even though the next review isn't for several years there is a need for a small committee to be established sooner in an effort to stay ahead of the review process.

There was a discussion about how the changes to the process would be addressed.

3. Announcements

a. C. Abbott announced that M. Murphy and K. Fogal were unable to attend the meeting to give their FCCC update, however a copy of their report will be sent to the Senators.

C. Belle-Isle stated that the FCCC is currently working on a Seamless Transfer Requirements Resolution which is being voted on December 17th. There are several significant changes being proposed and the most significant change relates to the elimination of the AAS degree from Gen Ed for 60 hours.

As of today the FCCC is diligently working on correspondence to make sure there is some kind of alleviation of this requirement. C. Abbott, as a Faculty Senate President, sent a letter to the Provost request additional time to review how this will effect Gen Ed as well as completion. However, since there was already a vote the FCCC is still waiting to hear what can be done.

Faculty Senate Resolution 2.2: (proposed changes shown in italics)
2.2.4(1)(iii) to read: Reflect the approval of the Director of Adult and Experiential Learning or the Coordinator of the cooperative education course.
2.2.4 (1)(c) and 2.2.4 (2)(c): Participation in at least 180 hours of supervised work experience.

2.2.4(3): In some instances students not meeting the above qualifications may be admitted with permission of the Director of Adult and Experiential Learning and the appropriate Department chairperson.
