Based on his documented visits to nearly 60 public schools in 11 states, Mr. Kozol believes that children of the inner cities are more racially isolated than ever since the landmark ruling of Brown vs. Board of Education in 1954:

On May 17, 1954, Chief Justice Earl Warren read the decision of the unanimous Court:

"We come then to the question presented: Does segregation of children in public schools solely on the basis of race, even though the physical facilities and other "tangible" factors may be equal, deprive the children of the minority group of equal educational opportunities? We believe that it does...We conclude that in the field of public education the doctrine of 'separate but equal' has no place. Separate educational facilities are inherently unequal. Therefore, we hold that the plaintiffs and others similarly situated for whom the actions have been brought are, by reason of the segregation complained of, deprived of the equal protection of the laws guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment. http://www.watson.org/~lisa/blackhistory/earlycivilrights/brown.html
