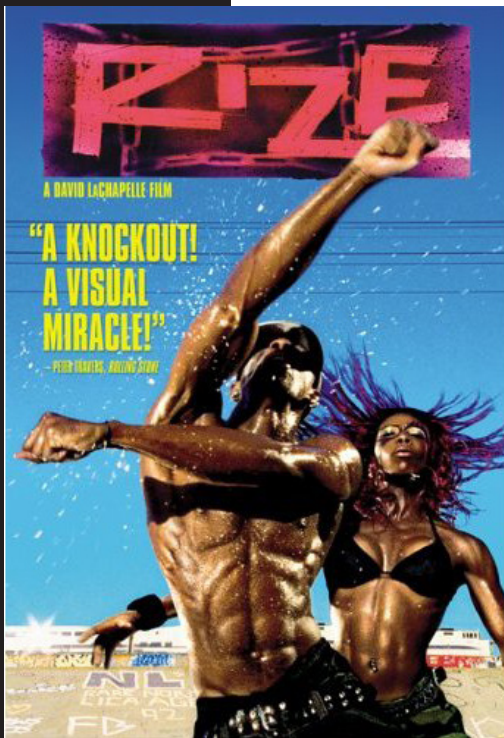


**IN RECOGNITION OF BLACK HISTORY
