- 1. The food was terrible. *However*, we had a good time. -2 simple sentences
- 2. The food was terrible, **but** we had a good time. compound sentence
- 3. *Although* the food was terrible, we had a good time. complex sentence
- 4. We had a good time *even though* the food was terrible. complex sentence
