GUIDING PRINCIPLE

Model UN's roots go back to the intercollegiate Model League simulation in 1927 at Syracuse University. Subsequent conferences, known as the Model Assembly of the League of Nations, Middle Atlantic Section, were hosted at various Mid-Atlantic colleges and university campuses. The transition to a Model UN simulation began in 1943 at Hamilton College and 1944 at Bryn Mawr College where Model United Nations (World War II allies) simulations were held instead of a Model League of Nations.

Annual conferences have been held every year since 1927 with the exception of 1945, when U.S. World War II travel restrictions prevented a meeting. Monroe Community College has been involved with this nationally recognized program since 2006.

We are excited and honored to invite students to apply to Monroe Community College's award-winning Model UN Program. Nationally recognized for substantive excellence, MCC's program enables students to interact first-hand with the challenges of international diplomacy, to debate solutions to the big issues facing their generation, and to engage with students and topics reflecting the world around them. - Numerous distinguished speakers from all over the world have presented at the NMUN conference in New York City. We have had the privilege to hear Secretaries-General Ban Ki-moon, Kofi Annan and Boutros Boutros-Ghali. Deputy Secretary General Amina J. Mohammed and U.S. Ambassador to the United Nation Susan Rice have served as keynote speakers.
- Monroe Community College's Model United Nations team won the best Position Paper Award in 2016, the Distinguished Delegations Award in 2011 and 2017, and the Honorable Mention Award in 2015, 2018 and 2019.
- MCC graduates from this program have gone on to find employment at the real United Nations and travel with non-government organizations to other countries. Some were admitted to well established colleges such as Cornell and Harvard. We are one of a few community colleges that have competed against major colleges such as Yale, NYU, Columbia, Princeton and Stanford University at this national event.

CONSIDER THE BENEFITS IF YOU DO DECIDE TO APPLY!

The Role You Play:

You will participate in a simulation of being a UN delegate advocating for a country that will be (for a short time) your country. You will learn everything about this country in preparation for representing the country at the Model UN Simulation Conference in New York City.

Honors:

Model UN is a four-credit writing-intensive Honors course (POS 234); students do not have to be in the Honors program in order to receive Honors credit.

Skills:

Students will gain lifelong skills such as communication, problem-solving, leadership, diplomacy, public speaking and critical thinking that will help them in their future careers.

Diversity:

Although the conference is strictly an English-speaking conference/simulation, students will have an opportunity to meet other students from all corners of the world. This is truly an international simulation.

Travel:

The lab portion of the course will be your participation for one week as a delegate at the largest conference simulation in the world, held in New York City with 5,000+ students. Travel to New York City takes place on Saturday, April 4, 2020, returning Friday, April 10, 2020.

Funding:

All expenses are paid except for required materials for the class.

Consider these tips before applying!

The Model United Nations class/program is not your traditional type of class. The class is very much *student driven* and *collaborative*. It is important that students know these important points before they apply:

This is a serious class.

Students must apply to the program. (You cannot sign up for this class on your own.) Because this program is very competitive and over 30 students apply every year, there is a selection process. Selections are decided based on information in the application and interviews with applicants. It is important that students commit to the program if they are selected.

- Students must be able to work in a team environment. or opinions.
- Students have to be accountable for their own behavior. rethink your schedule.
- Students must have an open mindset. perspective and having an appreciation of different cultures.
